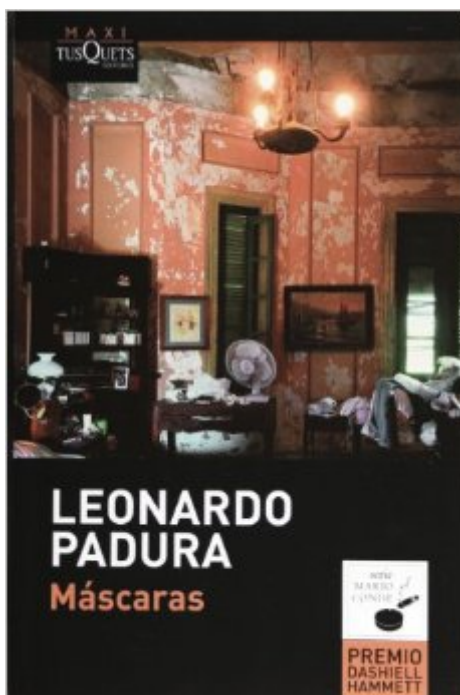


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# Mascaras (Spanish Edition) (Mario Conde)



## Synopsis

By means of the adventures of this character and his cases, the author sketches a portrait of the small virtues and great miseries of present-day Cuba." As always, Padura's stories contain far more than a detective story. The mystery is great, but more informative and interesting is the study of transvestism, as a way of creating a different reality, or mocking the "accepted" reality. Padura also includes some insights into the repressive regime in Cuba, and its effects on talented and creative people. My only criticism is that he does not seem to make a clear distinction between homosexuality and transvestism. Perhaps it does not matter, because the society Padura lives in treats both with equal cruelty. Great story. I like this author very much, and look forward to the day when his masterpiece "El Hombre que Amaba a los Perros" is translated.

Leonardo Padura is a first rate writer. He is careful and consistent with his characters, introducing them in many of his mysteries and his long novels. He has a wonderful sense of life in the barrio, and draws out the details and idiosyncrasies of life in Havana. I have thoroughly enjoyed reading his books.

Este libro es más o menos entretenido. No esperen encontrar una gran obra policiaca, porque no lo es. I have read PADuras' work almost in total. Mascaras is to me, maybe the poorest of his collection of short novels. Too much and too explicit sex, very long descriptions that made me lost interest in a couple of times. Even like that I like it.

This man uses more adjectives than you can find in a dictionary, so that any phrase is loaded with them; it is like walking in a fog. Is he trying to make it "pretty"? Or just blurry?

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
